Citing Your Work Using the MLA Style

Go to the Mesabi Range College Library Web page at www.mr.mnscu.edu/library and click on the link "Cite Your Work". From that page, click on the entry for "MLA Citation" and read through the directions on how to cite the various works you might use in writing your research paper, using the MLA Style. Look at the examples and pay close attention to MLA Style details such as formatting, indenting, punctuation & abbreviations used in citing each type of resource.

Now, cite each of the following four works, using that website's **MLA** format examples as a guide. Each resource must be cited exactly right to earn all points, so follow the examples closely! Each citation is worth 2 1/2 points.

1) You are citing a book. Sven Seversen wrote this book and it was published in Philadelphia by MultiCulture Concepts in 2007. The title of the book is "Sweden: A Primary Source Culture Guide".

The correct MLA citation looks like this:

2) You are citing a magazine article published in the March 15, 2007 issue of World Focus Weekly, pages 20-24. The article is titled "Amazing Sights of Sweden" and was written by Pierre L. Stone.

The correct MLA citation looks like this:

3) You are citing a journal article found in the Master File Premier component of the EBSCOhost online subscription database link at <http://web.search.ebscohost.com>, found on the Mesabi College Library web page. The article was published in the September 5, 2008 issue of Travel Culture magazine, volume 66, issue number 9, a monthly publication, and you accessed it on your computer last Tuesday. Mawa Umbaga wrote a 4 page article, starting on page 63, titled "African Cultures in Harmony".

The correct MLA citation looks like this:

4) You are citing an entire Web site called Iceland Adventures, which was last updated on August 1, 2008. You didn't find an author's name listed, but see that the Bureau of Iceland Tourism, in Reykjavik, publishes the Web page. You accessed this page a week ago today at <http://www.bit.org/travel/html>>

The correct MLA citation looks like this:
